

BRIDEGROOM

"And Jesus said to them, "Can the wedding guests mourn as long as the bridegroom is with them? The days will come when the bridegroom is taken away from them, and then they will fast." Matthew 9:15

This has always been a difficult passage for me. I understand in principal the bridegroom and what it mean, but many times I read right over it without realizing the impact of what Jesus is saying. Hosea 2:19 says "I will betroth you to Me forever; Yes, I will betroth you to Me in righteousness and will betroth you to Me in Faithfulness, and you shall know the LORD." Jesus is claiming here in Matthew 9 to be the one and only Jehovah! Almighty God! He is the bridegroom! What friend would attend a wedding and wish that they were, in fact, at the wedding? What people would wait for a moment pointed to by scripture and when that moment arrives stick to tradition rather than join the celebration? He is asking why would friends of the Bridegroom mourn when the greatest moment of joy for their friend has arrived? Why would you fast to humble yourself to become closer to GOD when GOD is standing right before YOU?!?! It seems crazy, right?

But what is the message for us?

Jesus isn't saying that you shouldn't fast. Quite the contrary, in fact. Jesus goes on to say, "The days will come when the bridegroom is taken away from them, and then they will fast." You and I live in those times... We are the church, and we are the bride! Do you fast? Do you long for the return of the bridegroom? Or, like me, do you have difficulty understanding what that even means? We as the church are given a very important job, and that is to be a light unto the world, the salt of the earth. There are many ways that we can do this, but chief among them is to build a strong and enduring relationship with GOD (Acts 20:24) and to share his gospel throughout the earth (Matthew 28:18-20).

Matthew 25:1-13 tells a related story of ten virgins who are given the task of going out to meet the bridegroom and lighting his way to the wedding feast. Five are wise and bring extra oil but 5 are foolish and do not, so when the bridegroom is delayed the 5 foolish women don't have enough oil to keep their lamps lit until the bridegroom arrives. When they go back to town to get more oil and the bridegroom arrives and the 5 wise women light the way to the wedding feast, the 5 foolish women are not recognized by the bridegroom and are turned away. Is it a coincidence that the "Bridegroom" is used here? Absolutely not! I believe the 5 wise women are an example of how we should live our lives in relationship with God. We will not know the time that Jesus will return but we know he will, so we must always be prepared. How do we do that? We know God, and we fast and pray. These two things MUST be a regular part of our lives.

- 1. Fast as an act of humility to take your eyes off of the things that you think you need to survive and to focus on the one thing you truly NEED to survive, an enduring relationship with GOD.
- 2. Pray in a way that seeks to know GOD through relationship, the way you would come to know your own husband or wife, through conversation.

Ensuring that these two parts of your spiritual life are practiced regularly will keep your lamps full and lit to provide light for the Bridegroom when he arrives.

THE TRUTH

LION OF THE TRIBE OF JUDAH

"Then one of the elders said to me, "Do not weep! See, the Lion of the tribe of Judah, the Root of David, has triumphed. He is able to open the scroll and its seven seals."

Revelation 5:5 (NKJV)

"Judah, you are he whom your brothers shall praise; Your hand shall be on the neck of your enemies; Your father's children shall bow down before you. Judah is a lion's whelp; From the prey, my son, you have gone up. He bows down, he lies down as a lion; And as a lion, who shall rouse him?" Genesis 49:8-9 (NKJV)

Our family recently read C.S. Lewis's "The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe" from the Chronicles of Narnia series. There is a moment in the book when Lucy, a young girl, is learning about Aslan. In the fictional story, Aslan is a symbol for Jesus and His significance in our lives.

"Aslan is a lion- the Lion, the great Lion."

"Ooh," said Susan. "I thought he was a man. Is he - quite safe? I shall feel rather nervous about meeting a lion."

"Safe?" said Mr. Beaver. "Who said anything about safe? 'Course he isn't safe. But he's good. He's the King, I tell you."

When I think of a lion, I picture a fierce king of the land who is powerful and who rules over what's around him. I think of an animal worthy of praise because he can conquer enemies and demands the other creatures to bow to his strength and dignity. I see a lion who sleeps soundly because no creature would dare rouse him. Much like the lion described in Genesis 49, a lion can bring me to a sense of awe.

While it's true that a lion is mighty and fearsome, it is also dependent upon God. Without having a God-given purpose and place in the world, a lion could just as well be any other big animal. Why, then, did Jacob (Israel) choose a lion as the symbol for his son Judah? Why was a lion the picture of Judah's tribe?

We know now that Judah would be the tribe whose lineage would lead us eventually to Jesus. Jesus on earth was commanding and powerful, One who defended and protected-but also who was completely dependent upon God for His purpose. Just as a lion does not choose its place in the food chain or provide its own meals or shelter, Jesus- described in Revelation as the conqueror over all sin- depended upon the Father for His purpose, strength, guidance and timing while He was on earth.

As you continue in this advent season, consider that Jesus was born both a strong conqueror and submissive God-follower. He does have power and will use it in our lives when we call upon Him. We don't need a Savior who leaves us alone to carry on our safe and happy lives. We have a Savior who calls us to be dependent on Him, but also to be bold, to be an example for the believers, to be strong and courageous.

Pray today that God would reveal an answer to the questions: Among all the names for Christ, why consider that He is the Lion? Where in my life do I need Jesus show up boldly in my heart and mind so that it's not safe there? In what ways do I want God to meddle with my comfortable daily life and instead let me hear God say, "Of course He's not safe, but He's good. He's the King, I tell you."

GREAT HIGH PRIEST

Therefore, since we have a great high priest who has passed through the heavens, Jesus the Son of God, let us hold firmly to the faith we profess. Hebrews 4:14

The role and directions given to Aaron and the priesthood included specific duties. 1) To oversee the responsibilities of the subordinate priests; 2) To offer a sin offering for himself as well as the people and 3) To enter the holy of holies on the Day of Atonement to sprinkle blood on the mercy seat to atone for the sins of himself and the people for the year. This is the way it was always done in order to have your sins forgiven and to received God's mercy and grace.

This ritual was followed without question or afterthought because this direction came directly from God (Lev. 10:8-11). As this did last for generations to come it did have its drawbacks. Levitical priests were born into the position and the high priest were appointed into service to God for the people. They came with their own baggage of sins as well as the piety of the birthright.

Jesus was called by God, not of the line of Aaron thus, starting a New Covenant. Jesus does not need to provide an offering for his sins. He was tempted as we are and he did not sin. He remains sinless, he lives forever and can enter the presence of God and is our mediator to God (Heb 8:6-10). Jesus served as the sin offering of the people and covers us in His blood (Heb 9:12), an offering to God to that allows us to enter His presence.

We can celebrate this season knowing that we have an intercessor that will never leave us nor forsake us. The Great High Priest Jesus, is keeper of the New Covenant. All who call on Him will receive the promise of eternal life, free from sins of their life and enter the Glory of the Father.

KING OF KINGS

As a teenager, I knew all the video game systems, the release date of the next game, and its price. As a parent, we think that our kids will be in diapers forever. Then one day you wake up and they're teenagers or college students. We think that our car will always start because it always has. But one day, usually before an important appointment, it doesn't start. We are trapped in so many ways to our current life, our current season. We assume that it will always be that way, because it has always been that way.

Christmas is the season of the Messiah's birth. We picture a baby born in a stable, wrapped in swaddling clothes, lying in a manger. We are trapped again by the tyranny of the present into thinking of Jesus only as a baby. We easily forget that 30 years later this baby will die for our sins on a Roman cross. On the third day, this baby will rise from the grave and then ascend into heaven to sit at the Father's right hand. Remember Christ's words to us in John 14, "And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again and will take you to myself, that where I am you may be also."

As Christians we cannot just be tied to the present. We are reminded over and over again of this in the last book of the Bible. Revelation describes how Jesus Christ will return not as a lamb to be slaughtered, but as a lion to judge and devour. Every knee will bow and every tongue will confess that Jesus is Lord. This is why John wrote "these will wage war against the Lamb, and the Lamb will overcome them, because He is Lord of lords and King of Kings." During Christmas, celebrate the birth of our Savior, but also remember that the baby lying in a manger will return as a conquering king.

ONE WHO SETS FREE

"So if the Son sets you free, you will be free indeed." John 8:36

There are a lot of different kinds of prisons. There are prisons which are beyond imagination in their cruelty and neglect, while others are clean and merciful in their treatment. Some prisons are those of our own making, while others are created out of steel and stone. Imprisonment may be caused by our own misconduct, but there are also those who have been imprisoned through no fault of their own.

Regardless of the kind of prison or how we got there, two things are always true:

- Prison limits our freedom
- We want release

So it is that John's title for Jesus as the one who sets us free is immediately of great interest. The truth is, all of us find ourselves in a prison of some sort. For the majority of people, the prison which limits their freedom is not a physical prison with bars and guards, but rather the prison of our rebellion against God. And this prison is far worse than any physical prison. It is a prison out of which all other prisons are born. For this prison causes us to lose hope. It causes us to have disdain for our fellow man and treat them as objects to be used, rather than as those who are precious in the sight of their creator. This prison pushes us to violence and abuse. It is a cycle rooted in the earliest moments of humanity when we sought to place ourselves on the King's throne. Condemned, each of us repeats this cycle of rebellion and imprisonment.

AND

The one who stands as the righteous judge, against whom we have rebelled, comes with the offer of freedom. It is an offer unlike any we have ever encountered. It fully acknowledges our crime, yet offers a grace we do not deserve. Amazingly, the judge offers Himself in our stead. Through His sacrifice we have the chance to experience what is otherwise eternally beyond our reach; true and everlasting freedom living in relationship with Him.

This Advent season let us be reminded of the greatest gift we could possibly imagine: Freedom!

I AM

"I tell you the truth," Jesus answered, "before Abraham was, I am" John 8: 58

Jesus has been healing, sometimes on the Sabbath. That's not allowed. The leaders don't like that. Now the Jews are starting to put their trust in Jesus and the leaders, with their top credentials as sons of Abraham and their obvious-to-anyone rightness in all matters concerning the Law, confront him. Question mark as to who his father is or was, implied.

Jesus settles the matter with five words: Before Abraham was, I am.

Actually He says: I AM - YHWH "being". All the time. Past, present, future. In fact, outside of, free from our time continuum.

I AM WHO I AM, we sometimes translate it. God shared this name with Moses when He told him to lead His people out of Egypt. (That's tantamount to telling the Premier of a western country that from today there will be no more oil or internet - the economy would collapse. Not.Going.To Happen.)

It was a daunting task for Moses and he needed to know who was going with him. It was I AM WHO I AM. No limitations. And lead them out he did.

And so we see Jesus applying the same name to himself. I AM, the being one, long before Abraham ever was, in fact slain before the foundation of the world, the one through whom all things were created and in whom all things hold together, living to intercede for His people, seated on the throne and reigning forever. Son of the Father. And doing His works to fulfill the promise to Abraham.

Christmas - The eternal and almighty God comes to say: I AM *here* with you *now*.

SUPREME CREATOR OVER ALL

"By him all things were created, both in the heavens and on earth, visible and invisible, whether thrones or dominions or rulers or authorities; all things have been created through Him and for Him. He is before all things, and in Him all things hold together...."

Isaiah 7:14

Have you ever found yourself looking up at the night sky, it's width consumed by an endless stretch of stars beyond counting? Or marveled at the complexity of design and function in the human body? Both demonstrate the vast glory and beauty, from the heavens to our hearts, of the loving fingerprint of the Almighty God and supreme Creator of everything.

It is estimated that our own Milky Way galaxy contains some 300 billion stars, and that there are more than 100 billion galaxies in the observable universe. From the amazing Sombrero Galaxy to the nearby Andromeda with its one trillion stars, each fixture in the night sky is a testament to His power and majesty over everything He has made. And yet with such breathtaking power and beauty, God's word describes this endless wonder in Gen 1:14 with six simple words, "And He made the stars also." Talk about humility.

Did you know that the DNA stored within one cell of your body contains roughly the equivalent of 1.5 Gigabytes of data. And you have an estimated 100 trillion cells! That's over 150 Zettabytes (whatever those are), or 10^21! One 3 billion-pair sequence of DNA in each cell, if stretched out, would measure six feet in length. Stretching out all the information from all 100 trillion cells and you could travel the distance from the earth to the sun and back again. 600 times! It is no wonder Paul writes to the Romans regarding God's invisible attributes as being clear for all to see and that man is without excuse when it comes to God's creation and power (Rom 1:20).

But what is even more amazing is that despite the immense scale and diversity in the heavens or the complexity and purposeful design in our bodies, God is never far removed from each of us (Psalm 145:18; Jer 23:23). Despite His power and position of Lord over all things, His truest desire is that we seek Him in all things (Acts 17:27) and in so doing, we discover that He is very near indeed. May you seek out and experience the loving presence and touch of your Creator this Advent season.

Accept the best Christmas gift of all today by anchoring your soul to Him and letting Him escort you home to the Heavenly Father.

CHIEF CORNERSTONE

"The stone which the builders rejected has become the chief cornerstone." Ps. 118:22

A cornerstone is the first stone set in the building of a stone or brick foundation. It is measured, it is square, and it is flawless. Why? Because any flaws in the stone will be reflected and exaggerated in the foundation of the wall or structure. The foundation stone or corner stone is not just important in biblical references, but throughout the world great ceremony is taken when the cornerstone is laid. In ancient times, they would bury a sacrifice of grain or pour oil over the cornerstone. In ancient Japan, legends say that virgins were buried alive under the cornerstone. In current day Greece, a lamb or rooster may be slain and its blood poured over the cornerstone, or the height or shadow of the mason will be measured and the measuring rod buried under the cornerstone. Suffice to say, the cornerstone is important- very important! One of the things that makes a cornerstone so unique is that it bears a tremendous amount of force from multiple directions, and a mason would select a stone that APPEARED perfect with no weaknesses that might cause it to fail or fracture.

It's very interesting that Paul uses this description of Jesus because the very reason that he was rejected was that He did not come with the appearance of strength and power that the people of Israel expected. The people of Israel (the builders) believed that the Messiah would come as a perfect king that would exact vengeance for their suffering and conquer the world. But as 1 Corinthians 1:27 says, "God chose the foolish things of the world to shame the wise; God chose the weak things of the world to shame the strong." God chose to come to earth as a suffering servant... hardly the warrior king the Israelites expected. When God says in Isaiah 28:16 - "See, I lay a stone in Zion, a tested stone, a precious cornerstone for a sure foundation; the one who relies on it will never be stricken with panic". He was speaking of Jesus. His people rejected him, though, because He did not appear to fit their preconceived notions of what GOD would provide for them.

Why do you suppose this happened? I believe that it had much to do with the fact that our values are not in line with God's. Our image of strength is not the strength that GOD values in us. Our view of strength and power tends to mean the ability to overpower or dominate, while Jesus's strength came in humility and service. Our view of a precious cornerstone is one of silver, gold or something of exquisite monetary value. God's view of precious is a heart that loves Him above all else and loves a neighbor as oneself. I implore you not to reject the cornerstone just because it doesn't look like you think it should look or act like you think it should act. Serve in humility and love with a heart of God. The surest foundation that God has provided for us was one that served, loved, and ultimately laid down his life for all of humanity. Do the actions and perceptions in your life reflect the values of our cornerstone? Do you need to reexamine the things that you value in this world in reference to what is important to GOD?

One of the most beautiful pieces of music ever written is Handel's Messiah. It was written by Handel in 1741 and is an "oratorio" telling the story of Jesus Christ. It is an incredible piece of music and well worth the investment of time to listen to the full oratorio (the complete work takes about 2 hours). Over the years it has become tied closely to the Christmas season with songs taken primarily from the first third of the work (dealing with the prophecies of Christ' birth, along with the amazing "Hallelujah Chorus". But my favorite piece of the entire work is titled "For Unto Us a Child is Born" and is a musical setting of Isaiah 9:6.

Isaiah contains a number of prophecies of Jesus the Messiah, but in this verse we find four titles for Jesus which – when taken together – form an incredible picture of who Jesus really is. So, over the next four days, we will camp right here.

Wonderful counselor!! When you read that, it may seem that Jesus is the one to whom we can turn with our problems and concerns. While that is certainly true, it has little to do with what Isaiah is telling us. In Hebrew, the word "wonderful" really means extraordinary to the point that it is beyond the realm of normal human experience. The second word, "counselor" is used to describe a wise king, who is able to guide his people in the way they should go. When combined, Isaiah is describing the coming Messiah as the King of the Universe, who rules and guides His people with amazing wisdom and compassion.

Who do you turn to when you need guidance? When life is challenging and the way ahead a maze of choices and possibilities? Turn to the "Wonderful Counselor" as the one who can guide you in the way you should go. As the wise King, you can trust Him to direct your path.

MIGHTY GOD

"For to us a child is born, to us a son is given, and the government will be on his shoulders.

And he will be called Wonderful Counselor, **Mighty God**, Everlasting Father, Prince of

Peace." Isaiah 9:6

If you are a new parent planning on having your baby dedicated, would you mind skipping down to the next paragraph? OK, you skipped down, right? Now I can make a confession. I am scared to death every time we have a baby dedication. Don't get me wrong, I love each of these incredible gifts of God, but they seem so… fragile. Yesterday we learned that this babe born in Bethlehem was actually a great, wise King of glory. Today we see that not only can He guide our paths, but He stands beside us as the God who is MIGHTY to save!

Our God is a God for whom nothing is impossible. He stands ready and able to do battle with His people. How often do we read in the Old Testament of God going before His people in battle? Today we tend to shy away from any speech which sounds too aggressive or war-like. Yet, the truth is that we are very much engaged in a spiritual battle! A battle for our very eternity. In those dark days in Israel's history, it seemed like the enemy had won. And then, from (of all places) a food trough in Bethlehem, comes a battle cry. *El Gibbor* has Himself come to our aid. He, our Mighty God, walks with us each and every day and we can draw courage and strength from Him, no matter what we face in this Advent season and beyond.

EVERLASTING FATHER

"For to us a child is born, to us a son is given, and the government will be on his shoulders.

And he will be called Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, **Everlasting Father**, Prince of

Peace." Isaiah 9:6

Over the last couple of days, we have seen the babe in Bethlehem described as a wise King who can direct our paths with the assurance that following His guidance will bring us safely home. We have seen Him as the Mighty God, ready to do battle against the forces of evil which are determined to do us harm. Both of these pictures are an amazing encouragement and assure us that there is nothing we might encounter which will ever be beyond God's capacity to lead and to rescue.

But today the tone is a very different one. He is not just King and Warrior, He is our Father. I don't believe Isaiah is trying to make a statement about the trinity, although there are those who use this verse to discuss that aspect of God's nature. Rather, I think he is showing us a different aspect of God's character. He is the Father who will never leave us. He is everlasting.

One of the most popular praise songs of our day is "Good, Good Father." The song strikes a chord with most of us. I have thought about why that might be. Perhaps it is because, in our minds, we have a picture of what a father should be like. Admittedly, that is a picture that no human could ever live up to. At some point we must admit that, no matter how terrific our earthly father might be, he is still a human being with human frailties. That realization is amplified when the father in question is physically or emotionally absent. We long for a perfect Father.

Perhaps that longing can be explained by the fact that each of us were created with a need for a connection with our everlasting, perfect Father, with whom we will share eternity. How amazing that God doesn't just want to relate to us as our King (which He is) or as the Mighty God who does battle for our eternal destiny, but as our Father who loves us. In fact, He loves us enough that He willingly came as a babe in a manger. He truly *is* a good, good Father.

PRINCE OF PEACE

"For to us a child is born, to us a son is given, and the government will be on his shoulders.

And he will be called Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, **Prince of**Peace." Isaiah 9:6

I had the privilege to become a godmother of the little baby boy of my friends. At the table where we sat and celebrated together, I noticed that when he was feeling tired, upset or anxious the pacifier was looked for. This little invention was a great help for him to become calm, it lasted however not for long. More than 400 years before Christ birth in Isaiah 9:6 The coming of Jesus is announced. He is referred to as the Prince of peace. What does this name of Him imply? He was born to fulfill a purpose which would bring peace to us. Peace in the Hebrew language is *shulam* or *shalom* which means translated "fully paid for." You can say He paid with his life on the cross, stretched out forgiveness to us and points us to eternity. To accept it in our heart brings peace with God and ourselves, we are made complete.

It is like the little baby, he experiences a temporary discomfort but when he looks for his mom and she holds him in her arms, he soon let go and is at peace. Like the mother who cares, protects and loves, we also can be at peace when we stretch out our hands to Jesus and trust Him. Jesus said in John14:27 "peace I leave you not as the world gives...." The verse doesn't imply that no problems or heartache will occur, it is more an instruction to us, to continue to trust Him also when life gets hard.
